The Magi were led to Jesus by a star. Who are the stars your children follow? Do not let it be the tabloid stars. Resolve in this new year to be guiding star in the life of your children.

Epiphany Family Activities

Choose one of the following activities as a way to further reflect on this Sunday readings:

- Place the Magi into the crèche. Identify a gift you have to bring the Newborn King. Talk about the gift with family members and invite them to reflect on the gifts they wish to bring.
- Take a winter-night walk on a clear crisp evening. Find the North Star or any constellations you recognize. If you have any small children with you, remind them that the Wise Men followed the brightest star in the sky in order to find Baby Jesus. Help them find the brightest star in the night sky. Enjoy this facet of God's world.
- In an effort to follow the light of Christ, it sometimes helps to remove some of the clutter in our lives. Choose an evening or Saturday morning in which radio, television and computer are all turned off and your home becomes quiet. If you have children, explain to them the need to seek God in silence.
- The three kings gave gifts to Jesus, and we just received Christmas gifts. Go through your books and toys. Make a special Epiphany box for the poor and donate the box to the St. Vincent de Paul Society or another place in your community that helps those in need.

The Wise Men

The wise men. Whether they were really kings or just local eastern chieftains or learned astronomers is not the least important. Their hearts were filled with wisdom and the aspirations of their race, and that is what really concerns us. Only men of the highest type could have undertaken such a journey for such a purpose. They brought all the longing of their people with them to the place of the encounter for its fulfillment.

Through the desert, by way of royal palaces, the libraries of the learned, and the chambers of the priests -- and they ended their journey at last at a manger in a poor stable. They subordinate their lives to the end in view, and they willingly journey to the ends of the earth in quest of knowledge, following a star, a sign, obeying an inner voice that would never have made itself heard but for their hunger and the intense alertness hunger produces. They believed in that voice more implicitly than they believed in the tangible realities of the mortal existence. The compelling earnestness of their quest, the unshakable persistence of their search, the royal grandeur of their dedication -- these are their secrets.

And it is their message for us and their judgment of us. Why do so few ever see the star? Only because so few are looking for it What are we looking for anyway? And where will we find a genuine yearning so strong that neither fatigue nor distance, nor fear of the unknown, nor loneliness, nor ridicule will deter us? Only such a passionate desire can prompt the persistence which is content to knell even when the ultimate goal turns out to be a simple stable. Those capable of such dedication penetrate to the heart of things and understand why that should be the outcome. A thousand secret longings of the spirit and the heart have paved the way for faith and sanctified them for the act of adoration. ~ Fr. Alfred Delp
